Across Dave's Desk...

Thank You, Lord. Now, Please...

We have just come through a terrible drought. For nearly five years, we have prayed for rain to replenish our lakes, heal our land, and comfort God's people and creatures. That prayer has been answered above and beyond our plea. Three weeks ago, Lakes Arrowhead and Kickapoo were at a combined 22.5% capacity; on Monday, they reached a combined 93.7%. On Saturday, at a called City Council meeting to address an impending flood, our mayor thoughtfully noted that, from our perspective now, the fact that our lakes were so low has proved to be an unexpected blessing; if they had been even at 65%, the results could have been catastrophic. God sees much farther ahead than we ever will.

It was hard, while we were going through it, to imagine the drought providing any kind of benefit. Still, it made us much more mindful of the need to be faithful stewards of the precious resource of water; it made our community an internationally recognized leader in innovative water technology; and it made many of us pray more fervently to God than we ever have before for something beyond our personal needs. Now, the merciful Lord God has provided us rain, rain, and more rain. And then, when it looked as if dangerous flooding was imminent this past weekend, and community leaders were ordering mandatory evacuations in certain neighborhoods, we prayed that God would diminish the rainfall, at least for a while. And that prayer, too, was answered; the notorious (and probably apocryphal) "dome" over Wichita Falls insured that while our neighbors to the north and south were being deluged, we were not. On Saturday, the weather service predicted that the Wichita River would crest at 25.5 feet, a new record; instead it made it to 21.27 and then began to recede. Saturday a week ago, we were praying to be spared a tornado; that prayer was answered as well. For all of that, we offer God Almighty fervent prayers of thanks. Thrice now, in three weeks, we have been delivered from the forces of nature.

Yet even as we acknowledge, with humble thanksgiving, our own deliverance (at least for now) from drought and flood and whirlwind, we also grieve the pain and loss of our neighbors to the north and south. In

Wimberley, the Blanco River rose 26 feet in an hour—a deluge of Biblical proportions. Over 300 homes were swept away. Laura and Jonathan McComb, their two children, and another family—nine people altogether—were sharing a vacation cabin on the river. As the river rose, the cabin was knocked off of its pilings. Laura frantically called her sister, Julie, in Austin: "We are floating in a house that is floating down the river. Call Mom and Dad. I love you, and pray." The house slammed into a bridge and was shattered. Jonathan was found downriver, gravely injured; their dog was rescued from a tree. Jonathan said when the house shattered, the family had been holding hands. As this is written, there is no sign yet of Laura, nor of their children, nor of the other family. There are no words to convey the sorrow this invokes. Could there be a divine purpose in such unspeakable tragedy? If there is, at this time I fail to comprehend it. "His understanding is unsearchable," says the Prophet Isaiah [40.28]. Indeed.

Jesus tells us that God "...makes his sun rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous" [Matthew 5.45]. Both the evil and the good are delivered from the drought; both the righteous and the unrighteous are imperiled by the flood. Life is only occasionally a matter of just deserts. Psalm 135.6 declares, "Whatever the Lord pleases, He does, in heaven and in earth, in the seas and in all deeps." Psalm 139.9 affirms, "If I take the wings of the morning and settle at the farthest limits of the sea, even there your hand shall lead me and your right hand shall hold me fast." The Lord is free to do what the Lord wills to do; yet the Lord also knows and loves us. As Job learned, to both his sorrow and his salvation, we can never fully comprehend the purposes of Almighty God in the midst of our own affliction; and so, we pray to trust, especially when we cannot understand.

The symbol of our faith is a cross, an instrument of suffering and death turned into a sign of divine love and eternal life. In what ways this current tragedy may prove redemptive, we cannot yet begin to fathom; but God wastes no pain. "For now we see in a mirror dimly," we are told in I Corinthians 13, "but then we shall see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will fully know, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love." We thank God for our own deliverance; we pray for those who are dispossessed, injured and desolate with grief; and even if we cannot now, at this time, comprehend the purposes of God, we nonetheless strive, by God's grace, to discern how we may be instruments of his love.

Wandering With Will...

As my time here continues to wind down, I am making preparations for what comes next, and part of that includes moving out of the place of my student housing in Fort Worth. As part of that process of boxing things up, I have been made acutely aware of a spiritual practice of material attachment, and the letting go of things. So many things in our lives evoke memories of significant events, and tell the story of who we are. And there are some things that carry physical value, the sort that can be measured in dollars and cents. It is good to keep some things, regardless of whether it carries material or sentimental value. However, in my case, a collection of poorly written second grade spelling tests that had correspondingly low grades (and what I believed were an attempt at art projects from a similar era), while perhaps of some value to myself and parents in the past, had exceedingly less value when faced with the reality today, ye alone the of the finite volume of a Honda Civic. Memories and stories being recalled may often suffice in a much more healthy manner than bearing the obligation to care for the artifacts of those memories. While that may be a case of an obvious need to throw things away, many of us carry things with us out of sentimental obligations. And this is fine to do as well, many have pictures of cherished family, artifacts that are family heirlooms, things that mark significant life accomplishments. It is said that one does not throw the baby out with the bath water, but perhaps it is wise to realize that it does not take an ocean to bath a person. But when too many things, and the keeping of them come into conflict with other relationships and cut into the living life, then one might find value in assessing what the burdens are, and the priorities that they take. I can say, that while I kept a handful of mementos from significant events and some things that still prove useful to routine life, that it was quite freeing to let some things go. Freeing not just of the chassis of my car, but also of spirit. The memories of some things live on, but in the case of some t-shirts ill fitted to me, these will serve another person far better than the space that they otherwise filled in a closet. This list goes on, as you may imagine, and it likely could go on for many of us, but being having assessed what is important in life, and tangibly acting on that assessment, and being more free to pursue the things that actually do carry value, this has been a liberating experience.

New on the Library Shelves. . .

Misquoting Jesus by Bart Ehrman

Misquoting Jesus is a valuable opportunity to understand how Biblical manuscripts and other written documents were reproduced prior to the development of the printing press. Scribes were an elite group in community and religious life who were trained to undertake the important task of copying documents for transmission to others. In that process of copying, even with Scribes dedicated to that task, errors were made. Some of those errors were minor unintentional omissions of words or lines, while others were significant.

Because original Biblical texts do not exist, Dr. Ehrman, in language understood by non-specialists, shares how modern scholars have developed procedures for comparing divergent texts. He further explains that the process and procedures used in looking at texts has frequently sparked controversy. The reading of "Misquoting Jesus," is an easy read, yet it ensures that readers might never read the Gospels or other New Testament texts in the same way again.

Dr. Bart Ehrman is the Chair of the Department of Religious Studies at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Fearless Love Rediscovering Jesus' Spirit of Martyrdom. With Meditations of Christ and His Love, by Mujahid El Masih

Mujahid El Masih, who recently visited our church, has written Fearless Love for those curious about the basic teachings of Islam, how God gives faith that overcomes the fear of suffering and death, how to reach out to Muslims, and how a relationship with Jesus Christ brings us to a growing fearless love. The fifty true stories of courageous Christians and illustrations will bring encouragement, inspiration, and hope in these precarious days. Fearless Love is formatted as an eight week study that works well in small groups, Sunday schools, or as a personal study. It concludes with seventeen practical suggestions in sharing God's love with others.


