

Did you notice the new paintings on the boards near the church library? If not, stop by to see what's up. There are 5 paintings by Shirley Steele Rescorla (Glorie's daughter). They are from a mixed media exhibit called "Hand and Machine". First, Shirley wrote a computer program to generate a moving series of geometric shapes and lines (the machine). She selected images from the continuous program to print onto clear mylar. Then she applied paint with brushes and spattering, interweaving brush marks and spatters (the hand) with the mechanical computer images. The work was part of a 2014 exhibit at Ceres Gallery in New York City.

Across Dave's Desk...

Francis in America

Speaker of the House John Boehner, a devout Catholic, had tried for twenty years to procure a papal address to Congress. Last Thursday, his heartfelt desire was fulfilled. Congress, by design, is the most politically charged institution in the nation. Republican Speaker Boehner and Democratic Vice-President Joe Biden (there in his Constitutional capacity as President of the Senate) sat on the dais behind him as Pope Francis spoke. Though both are Catholic, each applauded different points in the address. Though both were moved, Boehner openly wept. After a private meeting—one in which Francis asked Boehner to pray for *him*—he announced that he was stepping down as both Speaker of the House and member of Congress. As Speaker, Boehner holds one of the most powerful positions in the country, next in line of succession to the Presidency. After years of partisan fighting, and an unfathomable amount of soul-weariness, his encounter with Francis led him to seek a higher calling.

There was something in Francis' Congressional address that every partisan could cheer, or dispute. On NPR's *The Diane Rehm Show*, Lisa Lerer of the Associated Press observed that Francis addressed such politically charged issues as "climate change, abortion, refugees, immigration, capital punishment, income inequality, religious freedom, civil liberties, arm sales, poverty and traditional marriage." But as Texas Congressman Henry Cuellar said, "If you only hear him through the prism of the Republican Party or the Democratic Party, you're totally misunderstanding what he's trying to say."

It was originally planned that after the address, Congress would host a celebratory lunch, with many congratulatory remarks and a few (or more than a few) glasses lifted in Francis' honor. Instead, he went to a Catholic Charities shelter, where he blessed a meal for 200 homeless people. In various other shelters, he has, following Jesus' example, washed feet as a sign of his own servanthood. He also reminded them that Jesus came into the world homeless.

In New York City, home of Wall Street, Francis emphasized the importance of people over profits, citing Abraham Lincoln's declaration in 1861 that "Labor is prior to, and independent of, capital. Capital is only the fruit of labor, and could never have existed if labor had not first existed. Labor is the superior of capital, and deserves much the higher consideration." Lincoln's assertion was

theologically affirmed in the 1891 papal encyclical, *Rerum Novarum*, a major source of modern Catholic social teaching. Francis also held Mass in Madison Square Garden, was serenaded by Aretha Franklin, and spoke at the 9/11 Memorial where he said, "Here, grief is palpable. The water we see flowing towards that empty pit reminds us of all those lives which fell prey to those who think destruction, tearing down, is the only way to settle conflicts. It is the silent cry of those who were victims of a mindset which knows only violence, hatred and revenge..."

In Philadelphia, he went to a prison, Curran-Fromhold Correctional Facility, where he blessed all of the inmates and personally embraced many of them. He held a Mass on Benjamin Franklin Parkway for the World Meeting of Families. He greeted a family from his native Argentina who had driven 13,000 miles in a VW minibus to hear him, embracing them with a bear hug and laughingly telling them that they were crazy. He held private meetings with the families of the victims of priestly abuse (the greatest moral stain on Roman Catholicism in the last 100 years), spoke of his own deep grief at what they had suffered, and acknowledged the righteousness of their rage. At every stop, he embraced children—a little daughter of undocumented immigrants who slipped through police barricades; a ten year old with cerebral palsy; a baby dressed in a papal outfit. More than one secularist has been dumbfounded that a man who publicly states so many controversial positions should be so widely beloved by people who disagree with so much of what he says. It has to do with his authentic love of persons.

Indeed, the theology that best defines Francis' approach to ministry is called "Personalism," which emphasizes the fundamental integrity and dignity of every human life. From an acknowledgement that human beings are all made in the image of God, to the example of the Good Samaritan; from the assertion in John 3.16 that God gave his only begotten Son out of love, to Jesus' declaration in Matthew that those who care for the least of his brothers and sisters are caring for him, personalism is indisputably Biblically-based and Christ-centered. It is why Francis' declarations can publicly encompass such politically conservative positions as the defense of pre-born children, traditional marriage and religious freedom, and also such politically liberal positions as environmentalism, universal health care and immigration reform. Indeed, there is a growing nexus between Roman Catholics and Protestant evangelicals that is premised on the social ethics of personalist teaching, and is based on the Lordship of Christ, respect for Creation, and the fundamental dignity of every human life. If our increasingly divided nation is to have a future worth having, it will have to rely on far more than politics.

Francis' farewell words to our country were these: "This land has been blessed with tremendous gifts and opportunities. I pray that you may all be good and generous stewards of the human and material resources entrusted to you... I will pray for you and your families, and I ask you, please, to pray for me. May God bless you all. God bless America!"

And may God bless this servant of God, and persons.

The men's dorm, which houses up to 16 young men, ages 18-22, provides a Christian, home-like setting for up to 18 months, with house parents who teach the skills needed for the men to be successful in life.


